David Blandy How to Fly/ How to Live

John Hansard Gallery, part of the University of Southampton, is delighted to present two new digital commissions by artist David Blandy.

Each video will be viewable for a month on John Hansard Gallery's new website, launching on 1 May 2020.

Blandy's new works, *How to Fly* and *How to Live*, use the familiar format of YouTube tutorials as a jumping off point to explore ideas around patterns in nature and existence. These 'how-to' videos follow the typical online video tutorial format, in which a variety of subjects from make-up application to knitting techniques to automobile repair can be covered, and subvert it by showing the viewer how to make the film that they are watching. In a time where, due to social-distancing, video tutorials are more popular than ever, Blandy's step-by-step guides are tutorials that particularly resonate.

How to Fly demonstrates how to adapt spiritual text found on the Internet and juxtapose it with animal forms found in Grand Theft Auto 5 to create a transcendent virtual moment. The film will build up to a virtual flight of a heron over a sublime landscape, where the viewer is asked: How many of us can exert the kind of patience the heron does in waiting, watching, being ready for our reward?

How to Live uses video editing software to create a journey through images and video around life force, exploring photosynthesis, the geological forces around the creation of oil and coal and thinking about the future of human life without fossil fuels.

The new works build on conversations that Blandy and the Gallery had prior to the COVID-19 outbreak. When the landscape of the art world changed virtually overnight, John Hansard Gallery approached David Blandy about adapting their ideas into two new online commissions. The Gallery's new website, which is launching in late April, will feature a 'Video Wall' to host online exhibitions and Blandy's videos will be the first hosted online exhibition.

John Hansard Gallery's programme is aligned with the University of Southampton's new Summer Term and move to online teaching methods. Beginning on 20 April, the term will see the introduction of digital learning, for both students and staff, in keeping with current social-distancing guidance.
