

Call out for an Artist Educator

Space to Create!
May to August 2021
Mapping Southampton's Phone Spaces

THE BRIEF

Project context

This project is part of a 15-month research study led by Dr Eve Colpus, Associate Professor of History at University of Southampton. The research study is entitled 'Children and young people's telephone use and telephone cultures in Britain c.1984-1999' (ERGO number 56966), and is funded by the Arts and Humanities Research Council (AHRC), part of UK Research and Innovation.

It will examine the relationship between young people's telephone use and youth agency in Britain in the recent past, including in relation to young people's phone cultures today. The research draws on the approaches of child-centred histories and studies of technology and technology use, and seeks to reveal the untold history of children's telephone usage both as an activity, and its contribution to identity-making. It will put attention upon intersections between young people's individual and collective communication and social practices, and the cultural, ethical, social and political importance of everyday technology use.

There are three strands to this project:

- Archival
- Oral History
- Engaged Research

Dr Eve Colpus is working in partnership with John Hansard Gallery (JHG) on the Engaged Research Strand: Mapping Southampton's Phone Spaces:

Families and young people will be invited to submit memories, photographs and video content of their own phone use, or phones they have observed, in Southampton from the 1980s to the present day via the project website, or in person at JHG. This will form part of a dataset, which will be used to produce an interactive map that users can use to learn about young people's phone use in Southampton over the last four decades. The interactive map will be hosted on the project website.







To inspire interest and involvement, four Space to Create! workshops will be hosted by JHG between May and August 2021. These sessions will be designed and led by the Artist Educator, supported by a Gallery Assistant, using creative prompts with the intention of encouraging participants to put historical material from Southampton's recent history into dialogue with their contemporary experience. The artist will also produce their own artwork as part of this research, which will diversify the visualised results and evaluation of the data collection in this strand.

About Space to Create!

Space to Create! is an established, free, family friendly, drop-in activity for visitors to draw, make and build together. These sessions usually happen at John Hansard Gallery every Saturday from 12-4pm. During the COVID-19 restrictions, many of our session are held online and have digital resources: www.jhg.art/resources

Space to Create! is often an entry point for new gallery visitors who are supported in taking part in focused activities and has created positive connections with many people within walking distance of the Gallery. Families have opportunities to work with professional artists, gallery staff or independently use the prompts and materials provided. In each session they can explore the themes, new materials and processes inspired by the exhibiting artists and other gallery projects. These regular sessions encourage repeat visits and a chance for participants to build confidence and skills, socialise together and to make the connection between what they are creating and broader concepts.

About John Hansard Gallery:

Part of the University of Southampton, John Hansard Gallery is an internationally recognised and locally engaged contemporary art gallery based in the heart of the city, placing learning and engagement at the heart of all its activities.

We are seeking to appoint an artist who:

- Has an established portfolio of socially engaged practice with family groups.

- Represent John Hansard Gallery positively throughout the project.

- Your outline approach to working with families, especially your approach to offering sessions and or resources online (if restrictions continue)
- Materials and equipment
- Evaluation and documentation
