





Call out for an Artist-Educator Telephonic Youth

THE BRIEF

Project context

This project is part of a 15-month research study led by Dr Eve Colpus, Associate Professor of History at University of Southampton. The research study is entitled 'Children and young people's telephone use and telephone cultures in Britain c.1984-1999' (University of Southampton Ethics and Research Governance Online number: 56966), and the project logo is 'Telephonic Youth'. The research is funded by the Arts and Humanities Research Council (AHRC), part of UK Research and Innovation, and the project partners are BT Heritage & Archives and John Hansard Gallery.

The research is examining the relationship between young people's telephone use and youth agency in Britain in the recent past, including in relation to young people's phone cultures today. The research draws on the approaches of child-centred histories and studies of technology and technology use, and seeks to reveal the untold history of children's telephone usage both as an activity, and its contribution to identity-making. It will put attention upon intersections between young people's individual and collective communication and social practices, and the cultural, ethical, social and political importance of everyday technology use.

There are three strands to this project:

- 1. Archival
- 2. Oral History
- 3. Engaged Research

Dr Eve Colpus is working in partnership with John Hansard Gallery on the Engaged Research strand:

We are running a series of ten art workshops with young people aged 14-19 that will look at young people's experiences with phones today in comparison with those of young people in the 1980s and 1990s. We want to bring the history of young people's phone use to the public through using









visual art, writing, and stories to make a creative response. We would like young people to help to create this narrative and help to bring this history to life.

To inspire interest and involvement, we are seeking an experienced and highly motivated artisteducator. The artist will be working with about 12 young people who have volunteered to take part.

Eight of these sessions will take place over four months between October 2021 and January 2022, and will take place on weekday evenings from 5.30pm to 7.30pm. The workshops will happen in a place that is most comfortable to the group — this could be in the John Hansard Gallery, but it could be elsewhere if the group prefer.

Two of the sessions will involve co-curating and co-producing a professional exhibition with the project participants, using the materials made during the earlier workshops. This exhibition will be shown on the Mezzanine, John Hansard Gallery in 2022. The young researchers will have intellectual property rights over the artworks they create. They will be given the option as to whether they would like the artworks to be made public or not, and whether they wish for them to be returned to them at the end of the project.

We are inviting artists who have experience and interest in working with young people, and who are keen to respond to different source materials, such as using visual data in qualitative research (Banks & Zeitlyn, 2015; Mannay, 2016). The aim will be to capture insights into the individual impacts of young people's experiences as phone users, using object and visual elucidation around data and sources collected in the wider project to stimulate reflection amongst the group.

For example, this might involve showing photographs featuring young people's individual or group telephone use (researched in Strand 1), and then facilitating group discussion. Participants will be supported by the artist to produce their own creative responses to the materials in creative media of their choosing, e.g. paintings, drawings, audio or visual recordings, or zines.

Charting changes in young people's thinking and engagement will be equally as important as the creative outputs of these workshops, and a key goal of this research is to support young people's self-development through the opportunity for their contribution to academic research and professional creative practice, building upon the Arts Council England's 7 Quality Principles for Children and Young People (<u>https://www.artscouncil.org.uk/quality-metrics/quality-principles</u>).

The workshops will develop John Hansard Gallery's aspirations to offer challenging and relevant artistic opportunities that extend to a wider community. Specifically, they will augment the Gallery's wider work with children and young people through its family-friendly activities, as well as the Gallery's work with ENGAGE (the gallery education network body), and its focus as a centre for Arts Award delivery.

- How your artistic approach and socially engaged practice fits the brief
- Your outline approach to working with young people, especially your approach to offering sessions and / or resources online (if restrictions continue)
- Materials and equipment
