1. Elsie Kibue -Ngare (Visual Artist)

Elsie Kibue contributes to the project by showcasing/celebrating and discussing her new work which explores themes and breath of her identity, from relationships to her kenyan heritage via her visual photography creation

2. Adaeze Ihebom (Video Artist)

For the project, Adaeze Ihebom contributes to the project by showcasing, discussing and expressing her Italian British Nigerian identity through the journey of self discovery and self love via the medium of video art.

3. Adeola Naomi Aderemi (Priestess)
